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CND OHT Staffing Update




It is with heavy hearts that we bid farewell to Latha, Project Consultant, as she moves on to new opportunities.


Her role will involve various responsibilities aimed at enhancing primary care collaboration and engagement within the Ontario Health Team.



The CND OHT is pleased to announce that we are now accepting expression of interests from organizations who wish to become affiliate members.

About Affiliate Membership

As per the CND OHT Membership Policy 2022:

- Affiliate Membership is the entry-level stage towards full membership in the CND OHT.
- Affiliate members are entitled to regular information updates, but will not participate in decision-making activities.
- Affiliate Members are entitled to participate in OHT education and training at their own cost.
- Affiliate members are entitled and encouraged to engage in service coordination.
- An Affiliate Members may be eligible to apply to become a Member after one year.

Affiliate members are entitled and encouraged to engage in care transformation via Co-Design Groups and other engagement opportunities.

Eligibility

Membership is open to agencies that:

- Provides medical and/or social services to the Cambridge and North Dumfries population
- Aligns with the CND OHT vision and mission

The Ministry of Health is standardizing the inclusion of certain groups in OHT decisionmaking.

From Our Networks

Infection, Prevention & Control (IPAC) Hub

As part of the Ontario Government's COVID-19 action plan, to ensure the safety of our most vulnerable populations, local networks of Infection Prevention and Control (IPAC) expertise were created. This province-wide network was developed to enhance community-based congregate living settings through additional expertise, collaborative assistance, just-in-time advice, and direct support on IPAC practices for both prevention and response.

Our network, the Waterloo-Wellington Hub consists of three satellite Hubs, the (Kitchener-Waterloo-Wellesley-Wilmot-Woolwich) KW4 Hub, (Cambridge-North-Dumfries) CND Hub, and (Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph) WDG Hub. Our hubs have been working closely with regional partners since early 2021 to support the following types of settings:

- Shelters
- Supportive Housing
- Long-Term Care Homes
- Retirement Homes
- Treatment Settings
- Residential Settings funded by the Ministry of Health (MOH)
- Residential Settings for adults and children funded by Ministry of Children Community and Social Services (MCCSS)
- Correctional Facilities

Locally, congregate care settings are supported by both KW4 and CND Hubs as service providers often span both regions. The Hubs' support varies by congregate care setting but services range from IPAC education for staff and visitors and supportive consults, to best practice recommendations and support.

We've utilized our staff's combined years of congregate care experience to build relationships with many leads region-wide, working alongside our leaders to build front-line staff confidence in all areas of IPAC.
